




SISTERHOOD MATTERS!

Temple Member SPOTLIGHT: The Schiffer Family

It says something when you grow up going to a temple and then as an adult you decide to come back to raise your own family. Eric Schiffer went to religious school, was Bar Mitzvahed by beloved Rabbi Henry Front, and was confirmed at Temple Beth David. Experiencing Judaism – especially the big holiday observances – alongside his mom Jane (a longtime Temple Beth David member) was a special part of his childhood. Though raised reform, both sides of Eric's family were orthodox and his great grandfather was a Rabbi.

Fast forward, one day Eric and Peggy met. Though they both graduated from UCI (Eric earning a Bachelor's degree in Comparative Literature with a minor in Spanish; Peggy a Bachelor's in Psychology followed by a Teacher's Credential), the two actually met and began dating when Eric was starting law school. After passing the bar and getting established in his career, the two wed, yet not before they spoke extensively about how to make their interfaith relationship work as she was Catholic and he Jewish. Eric says it's a process that some interfaith couples avoid, to their detriment. For them, however, the journey included attending an interfaith educational program hosted by another temple and making a commitment to one another to raise their children Jewish. After a few years at the other temple where they first attended that interfaith educational program, they met and felt an instant connection with Rabbi Nancy Myers and were inspired by the growing diversity of Temple Beth David's congregation. They joined in 2009 which for Eric was like coming back home. Since then their son Zack, a high school freshman, had his Bar Mitzvah in 2013. Their daughter Leah, a 7th grader, will have her Bat Mitzvah this April.

It was Eric who recently inspired our Temple Board to launch an Interfaith program such as the one that was so helpful to him and Peggy. As a result, one will begin here this month.

Now a look further back. Eric is of Hungarian and Russian descent, was born on the east coast, and moved to California when he was eight. Through school he was in theater and choir, and graduated high school at the top of his class. After becoming an attorney, he earned a Master's degree in English at California State University, Long Beach. Since he says being a lawyer is 90 percent writing, he's glad he did! He now has his own law firm – Schiffer & Buus, APC – with one partner who he met in law school. Well known for specializing in civil appeals, Eric has had four opinions published making them precedent in the court of law. In addition to serving on the Temple's Board as VP of Operations, which he says is his way of giving back and also



being a good role model for his own kids, this dynamo leader and dad is also on the Southwestern Law School's Board of Trustees and was on the City of Westminster's Personnel Commission until the family took new residence in Rossmoor. He is a member of our temple choir with a great group of people under the direction of the ever talented Cantor Nancy Linder.

Peggy is of Italian and Korean descent and was also born on the east coast. As a result, Judaism wasn't foreign and it was a faith she understood and is supportive of raising her kids in while continuing to remain Catholic herself. As a family they enjoy honoring one another's holidays. Peggy is a dedicated elementary school teacher in the Los Alamitos Unified School District. Having been involved in speech and debate throughout her own education, one of her many admirable traits, Eric says, is what an engaging speaker she is.

As a family, a favorite pastime is exploring the grandeur and beauty of national parks. They love going to theater, singing, watching Zack perform in his high school's show choir, and seeing Leah being bitten by the acting bug. The proud parents marvel at how much Zack and Leah care for one another and heed their parents' advice to work hard and appreciate where that gets you. There is also lots of laughter in the house which may explain why all four have appeared on TV game shows – Peggy on Hollywood Squares, Eric on Win Ben Stein's Money, and with the kids on Family Game Night.

The Schiffer household also includes their dog Epo ("pretty" in Korean), Louie the parrotlet, Moe the goldfish, and the 13 koi that came with their new house.

ARZA By Charlie Niederman Association of Reform Zionists of America

The World Zionist Congress will be held in October this year. The last Congress was held in 2010 and I was fortunate enough to be designated a delegate. The Congress is prescribed to be held every 4 years, but it has often been extended to 5 years as is the case this year. It is the meeting at which all the world's important Jewish organizations have a voice. Before 1948, when the State of Israel was established, it met in various European locations, but since statehood it has met in Jerusalem.

Representation at the Congress is allocated by the World Zionist Constitution. The number of delegates to Congress will be allocated in the following proportion: Israel 38%, United States of America 29%, other countries of the Diaspora 33%. This works out to 145 delegates for the USA. IT IS WHY IT IS IMPORTANT FOR YOU TO VOTE. The congress decides how the millions of dollars allocated worldwide is distributed in both Israel and the Diaspora. It means that the Reform and Conservative movements in Israel can get funding, because Israel funds only the Orthodox. It means that there is money for all streams of Judaism to reestablish themselves in the former Soviet Union, and that funding can be available to fight the rise in anti-Semitism in Europe. Your vote can influence who is the Chairmen of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish National Fund, and who fills all the other important positions of the World Zionist Organizations until the next Congress; assuring that the things passed by the Congress will get done. Some of the resolutions passed by the committee I served on, and approved by the Congress were increased representation in the congress by youth and women to assure that the Congress was representative of all world Jewry. The ARZA representatives and others that we allied with were successful in getting those and other meaningful resolutions passed to assure all Jews receive the support and respect they deserve.

Voting for representation in the US delegation is now underway and ends on April 30, 2015. You can register and vote at the same time. Every Jewish man and woman over 18 is entitled to vote for the slate of his or her choice. You may vote by going to the ARZA website www.arza.org and clicking on "Vote" and then "Vote now" and following the directions. To cover the election cost the American Zionist Movement, who run the voting, charges a \$5 fee for persons under age 30, and \$10 for those over age 30. PLEASE VOTE THE ARZA SLATE.

A few brief comments on the campaigning for Israel's Knesset election scheduled for March 17th:

- As to whether Prime Minister Netanyahu should have been invited to address Congress that is being debated in the US, whether he should have accepted is being debated in Israel.
- The polls indicate the Likud and the Labor/ Livni are in a near dead heat with Labor/ Livni leading about 25 seats to 23 for Likud with Labor/Livni making slow gains. In terms of coalitions, the right and Likud has a distinct lead over the center left and Labor/ Livni.
- The Arab parties are presenting a United Front which is the third largest single party with 12 seats and along with the combined Ultra-Orthodox Parties with 14 to 16 seats they may be very involved in forming any coalition government.

Election junkies stay tuned in and remember that Israeli polls have been inaccurate in the past.

Local Synagogue Announces "The Interfaith Connection" An educational series of workshops exploring Judaism

(Orange County, CA -- January 2015) Are you in an interfaith relationship? Is it time for you as an individual or with your significant other to discuss your religious background and explore the role of religion in your life? Temple Beth David, a Reform congregation in Westminster, CA, has launched 'The Interfaith Connection,' and invites interfaith couples, cultural Jews, and all others interested to attend at no cost.

Facilitating will be Rabbi Nancy Myers of Temple Beth David who says she is honored to offer this opportunity for people to talk about religion, Judaism, their relationship, family, and more in a comfortable setting. She adds, "We are lucky to live in a time of options and choices. Every person and couple has a unique past, personal beliefs, and values that guide their lives." The sessions will include teaching, sharing, and exploring that is responsive to the audience's needs.

Eric Schiffer, who with his wife Peggy attended such a series years ago, inspired the synagogue to offer such sessions this year given the impact it had on his own interfaith relationship. "It helped facilitate important life discussions with my then fiancé -- now wife. It also was very helpful and enjoyable to meet other people in the same situation." Now a Temple Board Member, Schiffer adds, "We hope this series will introduce participants to others who are grappling with the role of Judaism in their lives and also provide the opportunity to explore what works best for them."

The program, which is intended as a resource for the community with no obligation in any way, will be on Sunday mornings, 10 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. Attendees may attend any or all of the five sessions. The first will be on February 8, with a general topic entitled, "Introduction to Judaism." Rabbi Myers will go back to the basics of Judaism, answer any questions people have, and provide participants the opportunity to meet and dialogue with the one another.

Unique during the second session, on March 8, with a focus on marriage and children, will be a mock traditional wedding ceremony officiated by the Rabbi and Cantor. Numerous Temple Beth David congregants will join together to renew their vows - a first of its kind celebration at the temple. Also watching the ceremony and learning will be the Temple's religious school youth, as well as loved ones of those renewing their vows.

The third session on April 26 will spotlight many Jewish holidays. The fourth session on May 3 will address other life cycles such as birth, naming, bar/bat mitzvah and rituals surrounding the loss of loved ones. The final session on June 7 will explore the topics of "What is a Jew and role of the synagogue?"

With the generosity of the Temple Beth David Foundation, all of the sessions are free to the public. The program will be held at Temple Beth David at 6100 Hefley Street, Westminster. RSVP is requested by the previous Thursday at 714-892-6623 or tbdavid@templebethdavid.org. More information can be found on the Temple website www.templebethdavid.org.






