



I recently attended the Women of Reform Judaism Pacific District convention: "Educate, Empower, Embrace: Lechi Lach" in San Diego with Eileen Tobey, Cathy Niederman, Deb Lelchuk, and Mulu Skinner-Harrison. There, we made and renewed friendships with 160 amazing women from 9 states and one Canadian province. We worshiped together, sang and danced, and learned so much. Continuing the discussion on what was called the Middle East Peace process, a recent article in the Atlantic adds some clarity to understanding what the Trump administration is working toward. Drawing from the administration's recent actions, moving the embassy to Jerusalem, terminating its UN funding for the Palestinian refugees, closing the Palestinian Liberation Organization's Office in Washington makes the possibility of an agreement remote. While not entirely "straightforward... This much is clear: Notwithstanding its repeated vows to the contrary, the primary goal of an administration that has given up on the current Palestinian leadership isn't to encourage or pressure President Abbas to come to the table... Rather, the objective is to fundamentally reframe the U.S.'s understanding of, and policy toward, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, shifting the focus toward Palestinians' material, economic concerns, downplaying their political and national ones."

The policy's, "first target has been the two-state solution itself. The essence of the approach pursued by the three prior administrations (not to mention several Israeli governments) has been to promote such an outcome, based on the 1967 borders, with territorial modifications meant to address Israeli concerns. This, the current administration has stubbornly refused to endorse. Even if it eventually does so, its reluctance will have delivered a plain message: Palestinians are not necessarily entitled to a state of their own, and Palestinian statehood ought not to be viewed as the natural or inevitable outcome of this process."

By moving the embassy to Jerusalem the administration acknowledges, "Israel's long, deep historical and religious attachment to the city. It has done nothing of the sort for the Palestinians. True, it has said that Jerusalem's ultimate borders and questions of sovereignty are subject to negotiation... however, the meaning is inescapable: In the hierarchy of claims to the holy city, one side's is indisputable and sacred. The other's is negotiable and worldly."

"...The Trump team's theory is predicated on illusory notions—that the Palestinian people are more moderate than their leaders, and that their true preoccupations are bread, butter, and normalcy, as opposed to statehood, Jerusalem, or the fate of the refugees. Everything in the contemporary history of the Palestinian national movement supports the opposite conclusion: The current Palestinian leadership focuses on historical

grievances not in spite of popular opinion, but because of it. As far back as the 1980s, Israel's efforts to mollify Palestinians with quality-of-life promises were summarily dismissed as cynical attempts to gild their cage. Abbas lost legitimacy with his people largely because he is viewed as overly compliant, not excessively militant. If he has given up on U.S. efforts to reach a deal, that doesn't mean the administration should look for another partner. It means there is nobody left."

The article expresses much of what I've surmised and expressed in prior articles. The two state solution may not be dead, although facts on the ground are working to kill it. That solution is not relevant to the current US policy.

On another topic, a consequence of Israel's recent laws against non-governmental organizations that oppose BDS and current governmental policies has resulted in an unprecedented move. The Reform movement has begun furnishing its rabbinic students in Israel with letters to present to the authorities in case they are detained at a border. All first year students at Hebrew Union College are required to spend their first year of study in Jerusalem. What they are learning about Israel has changed from what their predecessors learned.

For an update on Israeli airstrikes in Syria against Iranian arms, and equipment shipments to Hezbullah terrorists in Lebanon, I've found strategypage.com offers current updates. They reported that on October 29, "Israel admitted that it continues to carry out airstrikes in Syria against Iranian and Hezbollah targets. Since Septembers 17 (when a Syrian SAM shot down a Russian recon plane off the coast in the aftermath of an Israeli airstrike) most of the news has been about Russia sending Syria free S-300 SAM batteries (which are still not operational) and openly blaming Israel for the loss of the recon aircraft and its 15 member crew. Israel rarely comments on these airstrikes, at least not soon after they occur or not until someone else (Syria, Iran or Russia) complains. None of these nations mentioned (much less complained of) recent Israeli airstrikes but the news eventually gets out as the aftermath of these airstrikes is very visible and not hidden."

I do not think you could have a better offer....do you?







TEN WAYS TO FIGHT HATE



1 ACT

Do something. In the face of hatred, apathy will be interpreted as acceptance by the perpetrators, the public, and — worse — the victims. Community members must take action; if we don't, hate persists.



2 JOIN FORCES

Reach out to allies from churches, schools, clubs, and other civic groups. Create a diverse coalition. Include children, police, and the media. Gather ideas from everyone, and get everyone involved.



3 SUPPORT THE VICTIMS

Hate crime victims are especially vulnerable. If you're a victim, report every incident — in detail — and ask for help. If you learn about a hate crime victim in your community, show support. Let victims know you care. Surround them with comfort and protection.



4 SPEAK UP

Hate must be exposed and denounced. Help news organizations achieve balance and depth. Do not debate hate group members in conflict-driven forums. Instead, speak up in ways that draw attention away from hate, toward unity.



5 EDUCATE YOURSELF

An informed campaign improves its effectiveness.

Determine if a hate group is involved, and research its symbols and agenda. Understand the difference between a hate crime and a bias incident.



6 CREATE AN ALTERNATIVE

Do not attend a hate rally. Find another outlet for anger and frustration and for people's desire to do something. Hold a unity rally or parade to draw media attention away from hate.



7 PRESSURE LEADERS

Elected officials and other community leaders can be important allies. But some must overcome reluctance — and others, their own biases — before they're able to take a stand.



8 STAY ENGAGED

Promote acceptance and address bias before another hate crime can occur. Expand your comfort zone by reaching out to people outside your own groups.



9 TEACH ACCEPTANCE

Bias is learned early, often at home. Schools can offer lessons of tolerance and acceptance. Host a diversity and inclusion day on campus. Reach out to young people who may be susceptible to hate group propaganda and prejudice.



10 DIG DEEPER

Look inside yourself for biases and stereotypes. Commit to disrupting hate and intolerance at home, at school, in the workplace and in faith communities.
