

## Is it Kosher for Passover? Rabbi Myers

April 2019

"And you shall observe the Feast of Unleavened Bread; for in this same day have I brought your ranks out of the land of Egypt; therefore shall you observe this day in your generations by an ordinance forever. In the first month, on the fourteenth day of the month at evening, you shall eat unleavened bread, until the twenty first day of the month at evening. Seven days shall there be no leaven found in your houses... You shall eat nothing leavened; in all your habitations shall you eat unleavened bread." Exodus 12:17-20

Passover is one the most widely observed Jewish holidays. Sitting with family and friends enjoying the seder, hearing the four questions, eating matza ball soup, and looking for the afikoman, captivates children as well as adults. This year, the first night seder is on Friday night, April 19. On Saturday morning at 10:30 a.m., April 20, we will have a festival Passover Shabbat service. And of course, on Saturday night, at 6:00 p.m. will be our wonderful congregational Passover seder. Don't forget to RSVP for this! Passover concludes on Friday night, April 26 or if you are observing by Conservative/Orthodox standards, it concludes on the following Saturday night.

Within our own community, people keep Passover in differing ways. Some only eat matzah at the seder while others try to keep the Passover laws during the entire week. Some eat corn, rice, and beans during Passover while others avoid these things along with all their derivatives such as corn starch, oils, and syrups. As a Reform rabbi, I don't normally get many questions about kashrut but they seem to come up more at this time of year.

The Torah tells us to eat unleavened bread during Passover and to avoid eating and having anything that is *hametz*, i.e. leavened, in our homes. But what is leaven? In Mishneh Pesachim 2:5 (a 3<sup>rd</sup> century CE rabbinical work), we are told that in order to fulfill our obligation on Passover we must eat unleavened wheat, barley, spelt, rye and oats. This is because these are the very same products that have the potential to become *hametz* if not scrupulously watched in their initial preparation. What makes our matzah kosher for Passover is that it has been carefully timed from the moment water comes into contact with the wheat to prevent any 'leavening' from occurring. So any food, without a Kosher for Passover symbol, containing wheat, barley, spelt, rye and oats is considered *hametz* and is strictly forbidden during Passover.

I have to say that it's fairly easy to avoid spelt. What is spelt anyway? Barley is not found in many products. Abstaining from rye bread isn't much of an imposition. Oats can be more difficult but most of us can forgo oatmeal for breakfast. It is wheat though that makes things challenging. What this means is no wheat pasta, bread, crackers, cereals, soy sauce (yes, I was seriously bummed to learn that it contains wheat), snacks, and etc.

What about corn, peanuts, peas, millet, lentils, and rice? Now, this gets to be a bit more complicated but it all comes down to whether you want to observe Ashkenazi (East European) or Sephardic (Spanish) customs.

The Ashkenazi rabbis, beginning in the 13th century, decided to add legumes and seeds to the list of prohibitions while the Sephardic rabbis did not. What is the reason for the stringency of our Eastern European ancestors? Firstly, rice and legumes could be cooked in such as way as to resemble the five forbidden grains so that if one eats a rice cake, for example, they may accidentally eat a wheat one. Secondly, the five grains could get mixed up with rice or legumes in the fields or packaging, especially in a pre-modern setting and therefore, we should avoid them. The last reason is "keeping the traditions of our ancestors", namely, because our grandparents observed Passover in this way, we should continue with the practice.

On other hand, our Mishneh states quite clearly that **only** wheat, rye, oat, spelt, and barely can become *hametz*, i.e. leavened. In the Talmud, Pesachim 35a, we learn that rice and millet cannot become leavened, they can only decay or spoil, therefore they are not considered *hametz*. Maimonides, in the Middle Ages, also emphasized that only the five grains are prohibited. "Rice, millet, beans, lentils and the like, though, cannot become *hametz*; even if one kneads rice flour or the like in boiling water and covers it with a cloth until it swells up like dough which has fermented, this is permitted for eating on Passover." (See Chametz Umatzah 5:1 and Artscroll "The Festivals in Halachah") Since corn, beans, and legumes are not considered *hametz* then of course their oils and by products would be considered suitable for Passover.

So what will it be? A Sephardic Passover or Ashkenazi? You can also see this as an opportunity to eat more protein and vegetables. Hmmmm, the decision of course is yours alone. And remember it's only for 7 days anyway... Chag Sameach!

## Message from Membership Chair

A Proud Aunt of a First Year Rabbinic Student/
And Why Can't We Jews at least Respect Each Other.....

A few weeks ago a little noticed protest took place at the Western Wall. The short article could be found tucked in a corner of a page in newspapers, certainly not taking prominence on page 1. For many modern Jewish men and women around the world, however, the protest was shocking.



"Thousands of ultra-orthodox protesters "violently" disrupted a Women of the Wall prayer service, forcing the feminist Jewish group to move to an egalitarian side section of the holy site after two of the members were injured. The group was holding a special anniversary service celebrating 30 years since its establishment. Some ultra-orthodox rabbis called on young orthodox students, both male and female, to disrupt the Women of the Wall and demonstrate against the non-orthodox worshipers. Young ultra-orthodox girls were bused in to protest the worshipers, and two older women were hurt in the confrontation.

For the Sudakow/Hoffman family, it was personal....my niece, spending her first year as a rabbinic student in Jerusalem, was caught, literally, in the center of the thousands of protesters pushing and shoving, occasionally inflicting violence. She was attempting to worship with the other first year students in her class. In the end, she came through the experience, but not without significant trauma. And not without a lifetime learning experience. This is what she said: "After 13 hours of sleep, I have finally been able to start processing the events of yesterday morning. I am definitely traumatized, as the memories of thousands of black hats and skirts screaming at me and pushing me is burned in my head. Nevertheless, this incident is one that will only fuel my fire to continue to fight for justice and equality for all people who experience this kind of horror every day. I am blessed to have friends and family around me who support me, and trust that HaShem sees who the real tzaddikim and chassidim are. Thank you, Women of the Wall Nashot HaKol for fighting the good, hard fight. I'm so honored to daven with you month after month."

I am grateful that my niece came through the experience physically unscathed and with a strong soul. Yet, I wonder.....if Jews of different backgrounds cannot get along with one other and present a respectful front, why are we surprised when groups of non-Jewish radicals treat us the same way we treat one another?



We will not hear anything about the US administration's Middle East Peace Proposal until after April 9<sup>th</sup> when Israel holds its Knesset election that will establish a new coalition government. Israel has never had a majority government, and the results of this year's election will not change that.

Before we look at the very hardnosed campaigning, here are the basic rules for the election that were mentioned last month. It is a nationwide election and the 120 Knesset seats are allocated to political parties by their percentage of the total vote. The threshold for a party to receive a single seat is 3.25%. The parties prepare a list of candidates in the order that they will be appointed after the election. The president of Israel then selects among the leading vote getters to form a coalition government that can command at least the needed 61 seat majority of the 120 Knesset seats. If that candidate succeeds, he or she becomes prime minister.

The race in Israel is dominated by two parties, the Blue and White coalition led by Benjamin (Bennie) Gantz, past head of the Israel Defense Force, and Yair Lapid a TV journalist. They promise to reunite Israel, and plan to serve two and a half years each as Prime Minister. They are billed as centrist, but are probably somewhat right of center. Prime Minister Benjamin (Bibi) Netanyahu leads the Likud party, seeking to form yet another right wing coalition.

Netanyahu chose to merge with the Jewish Home party and the extremist right party, Jewish Power that includes followers of the late extremist Rabbi Meir Kahane. Jewish Power's right to run in the election was challenged in early March, as was an Arab party. It was adjudicated by the Electoral Committee which decided to allow the Jewish Power Party to run, but ruled against the Arab party. That decision was appealed to Israel's Supreme Court who reversed the decision, and reinstated the Arab party and

disqualified the leader of Jewish Power, Michael Ben Ami. The decision was based on racist comments made by Ben Ami such as "We have to change the equation regarding anyone who dares to speak against a Jew. [Such a person] is a dead man. He must not come out alive. No expelling him, no stripping him of his citizenship. He does not live! A firing squad takes him out as the Arabs understand [best]."

Last week Prime Minister Netanyahu headed to Washington expecting an election boost from President Trump's recognition of Israel's right to the disputed Golan Heights, and a favorable reception to his remarks at the American Israel Political Action Committee (AIPAC). But then a long range rocket from Gaza struck a large home north of Tel Aviv, destroying it, and injuring the residents. He cut short his American trip and returned to Israel, but not before threatening the press with revenge for not giving more coverage to the Golan, compared to the covering of the rocket attack. Upon returning home, and trying for a victory lap, he was so insensitive to the rocket attack that it prompted a cartoon that showed him standing before the demolished home asking the family if they heard about the Golan.

It appeared that Gantz might gain the advantage after a warm reception at AIPAC last week, but in an interview for Israel TV, when asked about his plan for Gaza he offered tired platitudes, missing an opportunity to offer something new which would distinguish him from the current Likud position.

Likud jumped on Gantz comments calling him not strong enough to be Prime Minister, and the Israeli state comptroller released a report faulting the Israeli police for contract irregularities that named Gantz's bankrupt former company, Fifth Dimension. This pales in comparison to the Prime Minister's indictment for corruption, and it was recently discovered that he decided without input from the military not to object to a German contract to build an advanced submarine for Egypt.

Israel celebrities have also joined in the debate, most notably Rotem Sela, an Israeli model, actress, and television host, who has a law degree and is a member of the Israeli Bar. She challenged Netanyahu's Culture Minister, Miri Regev, in a TV interview about the role of Arab parties in the 9 April general election. MP Regev repeated a warning by her and Netanyahu's right-wing Likud party that voters should not choose Likud's main rivals because they might form a governing coalition that included Arab MPs.

In an Instagram Sela queried "What is the problem with the Arabs?" She continued the debate with "When the hell will someone in this government convey to the public that Israel is a state of all its citizens and that all people were created equal, and that even the Arabs and the Druze and the LGBTs and - shock - the leftists are human."

Netanyahu responded with an Instagram post of his own that referred to the "nation-state" law. "Dear Rotem," he wrote. "Israel is not a state of all its citizens. According to the basic nationality law we passed, Israel is the nation-state of the Jewish people - and only it." Israel's campaigning is rough, and notable comments are made during campaigns for which there are often post election regrets or denials. But we should be accustomed to that now in the US.

So what does the electorate currently think? A poll in the last 4 days shows the Blue and White coalition with 31 seats, and Likud 27, but a right wing coalition could get 64 of the 120 seats. We will know the results on 9 April.




