As of late, I've been noticing a lot of hand crafted items. I've seen hand crafted cocktails with homemade flavored syrups and unique herbs such as lavender. Burgers are made with fresh beef and savory and even funky toppings such as fried eggs and whiskey sauce. I even saw a restaurant with hand craft Pho where you could choose rice noodles or the low carb Shirataki and also each vegetable and protein. When using the words, "hand crafted," businesses are trying to convey that their product isn't mass produced. Some time and effort has gone into it, so it will be more tasty, appealing, and even unique. If we could choose a hand crafted item over a mass produced one, I'm sure most of us would want it. And so, I've been thinking about Judaism and the High Holy Days and I have to say in many ways they are 'hand crafted' as well.

Judaism just isn't a cookie cutter type of religion. Yes, we have beliefs and teachings to be sure but we are also a rich culture emanating out of the chilly lands of Eastern Europe, the lush areas around the Mediterranean, the Far East, Africa, and of course, the Americas. What has come with this is a fusion of different cuisines such as matza ball soup, challah, eggplant capanata, schnitzel, and a huge variety of herbs and vegetables. Our language has been permeated by German creating Yiddish, Spanish creating Latino, and more. We have various ethnicities enriching our Jewish heritage. By participating and making Jewish rituals our own, we can craft new meanings out of older traditions, we can find glimmers of insight that we didn't know were there, and we can anchor ourselves in ways unimaginable.

Ah! Handcrafted Judaism! So deliciously meaningful!

Glaizzel Garcia

We introduce to you Glaizzel Anne Garcia, AKA 'G' or 'GG', whom has one of the warmest smiles and genuine interest in meeting new people. She was born in the Philippines, in a Province called Ilocos Norte, where the main language is Ilocano and secondary is Tagalog. In her immediate family are her father Reynaldo, mother Leslie, Brother Ralph and sister Kristine. Her beautiful name was created by using a combination of her mother Leslie's name and a popular name at the time, Gisele.



The first Eight years of her life were spent in Ilocos, far removed from the nearest largest city Laoag, in the Northwest region of Luzon Island. There, she grew up closely with her mother Leslie, and extended family. On most days, you could find her playing in the beautiful beaches, bathing in the warm tides, with clear water and white sands. On Sundays after Church, she could be found climbing a tree and paying in the dirt, all while wearing a dress.

Just after age Eight, and after much planning from her parents, she came to El Cajon, CA to join her father Reynaldo, whom had left the family to establish work and citizenship when Glaizzel was just a baby. Reynaldo traveled back and forth as often as possible to check in with his growing family. Glaizzel's brother Ralph was just Eighteen months younger. Months later, her mother and brother also came to El Cajon. Three years later, Kristine the youngest, was born.

She experienced a bit of culture shock when she arrived but quickly learned what American kids do and don't do. While girls would play with their dolls on rainy days, Glaizzel preferred to be in the rain and mud. She would get scolded, but didn't care. Coming from an island town, being in the water was very natural for her. She does not miss the humidity of her birthplace, but the water always gave her a sense of calm and healing.

Glaizzel was naturalized during her High School years. She has since graduated with honors. Her BA in Cognitive Psychology was earned at UCI (University California, Irvine) and her Master's Degree in Education, was earned at ASU (Arizona State University) ...She has always had a strong work ethic in school and a continuous loving learning. She is currently an Associate Regional Director and is a BCBA (Board Certified Behavioral Analyst), in which she passed her Board Exam while abroad. Her goals and aspirations include but are not limited to ; combining work with travel , connecting with different cultures and breaking down barriers that keep people from learning how to teach people with disabilities. Students will enjoy our annual First Day of School BBQ provided by the Brotherhood and desserts from the Sisterhood at 11 AM. Thank you!

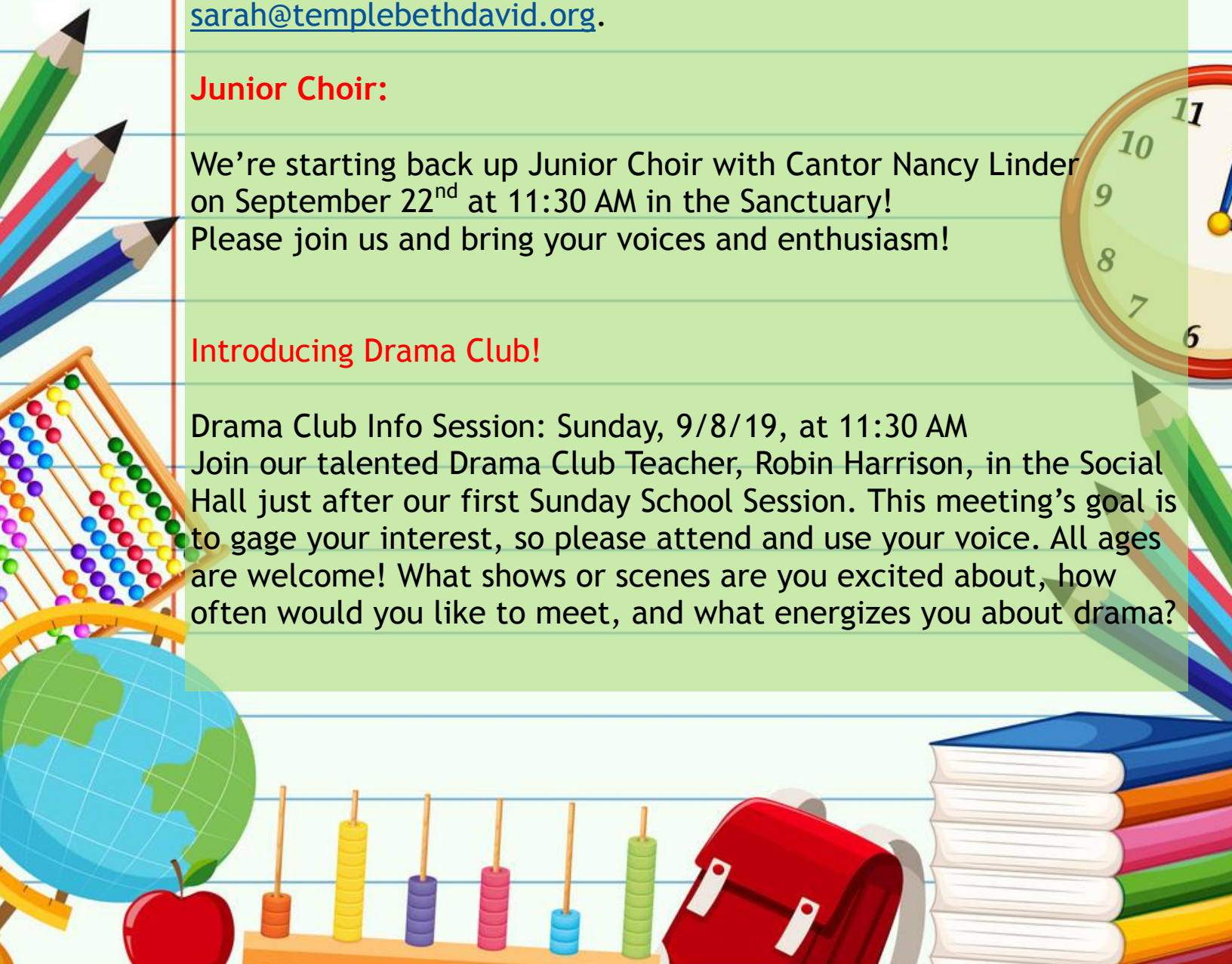

This year the Knesset has been a lame duck and in the mode of a caretaker starting with the runup to the April elections. Its status continued as the efforts to form a new government by Prime Minister Netanyahu failed to gain the 61+ seats needed in the Knesset. To avoid the possibility of the Blue White coalition forming a new center left government, the Netanyahu led Knesset voted to dissolve itself in favor of a new election on September 17. The election results will determine who gets a chance to form a new government.

To understand just how Israel's parliamentary elections work and to understand the election results, here is a primer. In Israel's parliamentary system the vote is nationwide and voters vote for a particular political party. The votes are tallied and a percentage of the 120 seats are assigned to the parties on the basis of votes received. To get any seats in the Knesset the party must receive more than 3.25% of the total vote. The individuals elected to the Knesset come from a predetermined list made public before the election by each party showing the order in which they will assign their seats.

At this point in the campaigning the parties are still jockeying for position, making coalitions with others, and offering indications of what kind of a government they would favor and with whom they would align themselves after the election. Campaigning more like our own personality contests comes later, just about now. A few things to look for are two wild cards.

The most wild is Avigdor Lieberman's Yisrael Beiteinu party that in Mid-August signed a surplus vote agreement with Blue and White (Kochal Lavan in Hebrew). Surplus votes are the fractions left over after party seats are divided up. The significance of the agreement is that Lieberman and Benny Gratz are talking and reaching agreement. Lieberman, hardly a left centrist, is primarily interested in defeating Netanyahu in whose coalition he formerly served. Currently Yisrael Beiteinu holds 5 Knesset seats. Hardly a game changer by themselves, but important in seeking the 61 or more seats needed to form a coalition government.

The other wild card may be played if Blue and White is called upon to form a government. It is likely they will need to include the Arab Joint List in their coalition. While a Joint List leader has indicated that they could support a Blue and White coalition, it is a far cry from either side to be willing to run the very real political risks of having the Arab Joint List included in the ruling coalition.

Breaking news points out a similarity to our own elections, in that the cellphones of Blue and White chief Benny Gantz and his top aides were reportedly compromised by Russian hackers earlier this year. GCI Group, an Israeli company specializing in business intelligence, found that Gantz and other senior campaign staff were targeted in a "powerful and unprecedented

attack by Russian hackers, the kind we have never seen before." GCI was hired by Gantz to investigate who was responsible for leaks from the party. GCI reported that Blue and White was not targeted due to poor security protocols, and that Gantz and his aides were not guilty of leaving sensitive data vulnerable to hackers.

The most relevant election comment I have heard was by Rabbi Peter Levi, now serving as the local ADL Director, who said he was glad not to be a congregational rabbi having to explain the September 17 election results in a High Holiday sermon. It is not likely that many rabbis will.

The election is hardly the only news from Israel. The now aborted visit to Israel by Representatives Ilhan Omar and Rashida Talib captured headlines. Israel, pushed by President Trump's tweets, invoked a 2017 law that entitles the state to deny entry to activists supporting the boycott. Rep. Talib was later given permission to visit under humanitarian considerations, but declined because of restrictions. An opportunity for a learning experience may have been lost in the fog of extremism. We will really never know.

Israel has just been accused of an airstrike in Lebanon by drones that targeted a very precise solid rocket fuel making machine, and equipment to guide smart rockets for Hezbollah to fire into Israel. This is not the first time that munitions and missile part shipments from Iran to Hezbollah has been thwarted.

As noted last month, after a less than successful effort by the US Administration to win Arab support for its new Middle East peace proposal, there has been little to report. The plan probably will be held in abeyance until after Israel's election.

To close on a very important note, the World Zionist Congress elections will be held from January 21, 2020 until March 11, 2020. It is important that we get out the vote so that ARZA, the representative of our Reform movement gets a majority of the US seats, to make sure that the millions of dollars that go to Jewish organizations are not all spent on Charedi and other ultra-Orthodox movements at the expense of Israel's Reform Movement and progressive organizations.
