

aspects of their lives and feel immediately secure in this strange, new, bizarre world in which we find ourselves; a world of masks, which scare my grandsons, physical distancing, devoid of hugs and handshakes, and uncertainty about the future. I grieved then and I grieve now. I believe we have to go through the stages of grief as much for our lost way of life as for the lives we have lost. Okay, we will all endure, without complaining, being locked in, unable to hug the people we love the most – if you will put an end to the pandemic. I felt saddened as I watched all my plans for the future become so uncertain. Would I ever make happy choices again? And finally, I ACCEPT, with a relapse here and there, that my life now is filled with family and friends and beautiful memories. I am beginning to ACCEPT that I cannot only survive in this new world of ours...I can thrive.

Now it is time to count the blessings in our lives....the real blessings, the family, friends and Temple we cherish; the freedom to make choices, the physicians and scientists who work day and night, finding a way to control this pandemic. I wish for all of us that the coming year will bring life and light, that we can emerge from grief to hope to moments of pure joy.

The process toward peace in the Middle East has shown little progress since Jordan and Egypt signed peace treaties decades ago with Israel. Two weeks ago, after negotiations with US administration officials, the United Arab Emirates (UAE) have agreed to normalize relations with Israel and Israel is prepared in the next weeks to negotiate the final details in the UAE. Israel has concerns about US discussion of the sale of F-35 fighters to UAE and UAE has said it will not agree to normalization if Israel expands further into the Palestinian areas. However, there is still strong consensus that a normalization will happen.

This week Secretary Pompeo made a four-day trip to the Middle East to encourage other Arab states to normalize relations with Israel. In addition to Israel and the UAE, Pompeo visited Sudan, Oman, and Bahrain who were considered to be receptive, but he got no nods from them. Sudan asked to be removed from the list of states that support terrorism before they consider normalization. He got no commitment from Oman, and in Bahrain Crown Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa said he welcomed US efforts to achieve the Israel-UAE accord, noting "the importance of re-doubling efforts to realize a just solution which utilizes peace as a strategic option to end the Palestinian-Israeli conflict." That drew a favorable comment from Palestinian negotiator, Saeb Erakat, who thanked the Prince for assuring that there will be no normalization until there is peace between the Israelis and Palestinians.

In Israel Prime Minister Netanyahu continues to garner attention from the press, but most of it is less than favorable. His trial on charges of bribery, fraud, and breach of trust will begin in January.

In an attempt to avoid allowing Benny Gantz to serve his 18-month Prime Ministerial term beginning in November 2021, as described in the agreement to establish the joint government, Netanyhu refused to approve a two-year budget presenting only the 2020 budget. That could have led to yet another election and the end of the joint government. Recent polls showing that Netanyahu's Likud Party is losing ground may have caused him to rethink a new election and he agreed that within 120 days from August 25th the 2021budget would be approved. The delay will at least leave open the chance that Gantz will serve as Prime Minister.

The Israel Supreme Court has issued a demolition order for settler homes in the unauthorized Mitzpe Kramim outpost, which were built on private Palestinian property. The Prime Minister has pledged not to carry out the order. A Likud party ally of the Prime Minister has called for the passage of a far reaching bill that will allow the Knesset to override High Court of Justice rulings, potentially setting off a fresh round of coalition infighting with Blue and White.

If you consider all this, and also that a second peak in Covid 19 cases are happening in Israel, it should be no surprise that there are street demonstration against the Prime Minister. In Jerusalem the Friday night demonstrations outside the official residence are referred to as "Kabbalat Shabbat" and usually consist of families. Saturday nights the demonstrations are more demanding, and have also been held in Tel Aviv and Haifa. There has been a call for the demonstrations to be held internationally in cities with large Jewish populations in the US and worldwide.

A young Israeli Rabbi was recently stabbed to death by a Palestinian authorized to work in Israel. Both were fathers of young children. Also, a Palestinian village in the West Bank was apparently vandalized overnight for the second time within a month in a suspected hate crime attack, Hebrew media reported today. Residents of Asia al-Qibla found a damaged vehicle and a Hebrew-language slogan graffitied on a nearby wall.

One last look at Israel shows that the situation of fire balloons and occasionally rockets from Gaza and retailiatory air strikes by the IDF against Gaza military targets is accelerating. At the same time, the Covid-19 virus is beginning to spread beyond isolation facilities to very densely populated Gaza. A major health crisis could be developing.



Tashlich at the Beach




