FROM THE RABBI

Community versus the individual



There's a great midrash, a rabbinical teaching, about individual desire versus the needs of the group. In Leviticus Rabbah 4:6, Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai tells a parable

about men on a boat. They are traveling at sea for a little awhile when one of them takes out a tool and starts drilling directly underneath him. The others are shocked and then exclaim, "What are you doing?" The man with the drill flippantly replies, "What do you care? I'm drilling under my area." The men with him vehemently disagree and declare, "The water will rise and flood all of us on this ship."

The author of this midrashic teaching recognized that when a person only thinks of himself, he can inadvertently cause harm to others. We can, of course, apply this teaching to a whole host of issues that deal with the environment, health and safety of people, and well-being of animals. But maybe at this moment, at least, we should think closer to home and heart. This is the point of our High Holy Days after all. It's to look at ourselves and how we can be accountable, responsible, and better human beings.

You will notice, for example, during Yom Kippur how our confessionals are in the plural and we all recite them. Even though, hopefully, none of us as individuals has committed every transgression, we state them communally. Why is that? It is to remind us that we are responsible not only for ourselves but also for our neighbors as well. We are part of a community and so we need to do our part to strengthen and protect it. Sometimes, even at the expense of our own individual desire or need.

There's always an inherent tension between our own wishes and those of the community. I personally like to explore win-win situations where the individual can get their needs taken into account while the greater good of the group is served. It's not always as diametrically opposed as one might think. Often a conversation and an attentive ear to hear what the person needs or wants can go a long way to figuring out a compromise that doesn't detract from the group. When someone feels cared for, they can often become more flexible as well. They are also less likely to see themselves as solitary individuals but can feel part of the greater community.

It's not easy to be sure. One who is drilling a hole in the boat of our institutions may indeed be self-centered and require instant correction but then again they just might be unaware. Perhaps careful thought can be given as to what their need is and alternative solutions can be found.

Maybe if we are willing to keep our own personal desires in check and strive to hear the views of the other, we may be able to get everyone on the same boat. And then together, we can enjoy a strengthened Jewish community.

Whether at my public school or at my Hebrew school, all education was valued. Mrs. Z. gave me a valuable framework through which to celebrate and honor life events, and these tools continue to enrich my life today. Because my parents believed so strongly in education — both Jewish and secular — I was supported, encouraged, nudged and, yes, at times required, to learn and to study. And, my parents' commitment to education came from their Jewish beliefs. My dad often said you can lose your possessions, but they can never take away your education. It's priceless and it's yours!

I am sure that all of us in the Beth David community have similar stories about how Judaism has shaped our lives in unique and profound ways, through experiences we have day to day, year to year, and generation to generation. As we anticipate this year's High Holy Days, we have the opportunity to remember and honor all the ways Judaism has touched our lives. I encourage each of us to find a little time in the coming weeks to reflect on these moments, share them with each other, and begin to envision how we want Judaism to continue to shape us as we close out 5782 and welcome the start of 5783.

The Megillah is going to come out every three months, so continuing to keep up with current events in or concerning Israel and its politics won't work when the articles are so infrequent. Starting with this article the intent will be to explain Israel's recent or upcoming major events, to update you on the Israel Reform Movement, and to discuss progress in achieving the kind of pluralism that will change existing Israeli law to allow life cycle events like marriages and funerals to be performed by non-Orthodox rabbis and will change things such as building the already approved family prayer area at the Western Wall.

The major upcoming event will be the election on November 1, when Israelis will go to the polls yet again. The early polling shows that the combination of right and far right parties is leading but things can change quickly, so Israeli political polls often do not correlate well with election results. Current projections will probably be meaningless on election day. To understand the pre-election maneuvering and who finally leads the government once the results are tallied, we need some knowledge of how the Knesset is constituted, how elections run, how seats are allocated and finally who gets to lead the Knesset and selects the cabinet ministers.

First, the Knesset is elected nationwide by all Israelis over 18 and not by region. They vote for a party, each of which will have published a list of candidates in the order seats will be filled. To win any of the 120 seats a party or a pre-announced alliance of parties must pass a threshold of 3.25% of the vote. The Knesset is elected to a 4-year term or sooner if there is a vote to dissolve or of no confidence.

No single party, or alliance has ever won the 61 seats for a majority, so after an election, the President meets with the leaders of every party that won seats to ask them to recommend which party leader should form the coalition government. The president then nominates the party leader who he believes most likely to command the support of a majority in the Knesset, not necessarily the leader of the largest party or alliance. The leader has 42 days, subject to extension, to assemble a viable coalition and then must win a vote of confidence to take office. So, it is possible that Israel may not have elected a new government before the Megillah Article planned for December.

There is one thing progressive and pluralistic Jews should be concerned about as campaigning and political maneuvering continues and that is the rise of the Ben Gvir's Otzma Yehudit party which follows the extremist anti-Arab views of the late Mier Kahane. Gvir is in the Knesset for the first time and it is the first time a member of the party was allowed in the Knesset. It had been banned, but they joined in an alliance with two other extreme right parties and earned the Otzma Yehudit's first seat as part of the current government. It has been working with its former allies about whether to run together again. It is now bargaining from a perceived position of strength as the polls show it could receive multiple seats in November, mirroring the gains in ultra nationalism in Europe.
