FROM THE RABBI

Can you forgive?

Oh, the simplicity of the words, "Forgive and forget." It just rolls off the tongue. But for any of us who have been hurt, angered, belittled, and even worse, it is very difficult. There's an account of a rabbi who

delivered a sermon one morning about the importance of forgiving one's enemy. Immediately afterwards, he asked," How many of you are willing to forgive your enemies?" About half held up their hands. Shaking his head unsatisfied, he repeated his question, "It's almost the High Holy Days. How many of you are willing to forgive your enemies?" This time, he received a response of about 80 percent. Still unconvinced, he asked again. With all thoughts now on lunch, everyone raised their hands except one elderly lady in the rear. "Mrs. Cohen, are you not willing to forgive your enemies?" the rabbi wearily inquired. "I don't have any," she replied. "Mrs. Cohen, that is very unusual. How old are you?" "Ninety three," she asserted. "Mrs. Cohen, please come down in front and tell the congregation how a person can live to be ninety-three, and not have an enemy in the world." The little lady tottered down the aisle, very slowly turned around, and said, "it's easy, I just outlived the bastards."

Oh, perhaps we can't or shouldn't expect to outlive all who have harmed us. Maybe there's something we can do in the meantime. As we prepare for the High Holy Days, forgiving and asking for forgiveness are essential themes of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Maimonides, a great sage who lived in the Middle Ages, wrote "It is forbidden for a person to be cruel and refuse to be appeased. Rather, he should be easily pacified, but hard to anger. When the person who wronged him asks for forgiveness, he should forgive him with a complete heart and a willing spirit. Even if he aggravated and wronged him severely, he should not seek revenge or bear a grudge."

Maimonides teaches the importance of forgiveness. However, letting go of our disappointment, anger, hurt, and pain can at times feel impossible. I have struggled with it for years. On my mother's side of the family, people keep grudges for decades. Yikes! I have found though if I can understand the other person's pain, grief, insecurity, and fear; it is much easier to let things roll off my back. I ask myself what challenges is the other person facing. Could they be having a hard time at work, in school, with their family, or significant other? Maybe they aren't able to express their remorse in a clear way but I can see that they are struggling. I try to not take things so personally but more of a reflection where he/she is at. With some compassion, I'm less likely to be offended or wounded and it is easier to be appeased.

So if I were to ask you, "How many of you are willing to forgive your enemies." How would you respond? Maybe we can consider it for the sake of our health, wellbeing, family, and friendship circle. *Selicha*, forgiveness, is hard. It's hard to let go but often we have to. We can't wait to outlive our adversaries, instead we can try to live and let live. With an open heart, an openness for *selicha*, we can move on to a new stage of relating to others and living our lives fully.

May this be a year where our hearts are big enough to pardon the offenses of others. May we be able to restart and maintain our relationships. And may we find greater fulfillment in this new year.

BOARD UPDATE



With the start of the Jewish New Year 5784 rapidly approaching, so many exciting and important events are taking place at Beth David. Most visibly, we are preparing for the upcoming High Holidays. Our synagogue is getting a deep clean, our silver is getting polished and the Torahs dressed in their traditional white covers for these special occasions. We start the holidays with Selichot on September 9th, followed by Rosh Hashanah on September 16 and Yom Kippur on September 25. Erev Sukkot follows on September 29

and then the celebratory Erev Simchat Torah on October 6. You can find the schedule details in our High Holy Days booklet sent out by our incredibly organized Office staff. And, as always, extra copies are available in the office.

Throughout the past quarter, our Board of Trustees and Community have been particularly active and doing so much great work behind the scenes that I'm excited to share a glimpse of what we have been up to. Let's take a look!

Our Capital Committee and Construction Committee continue to work hard to make our new, refurbished sanctuary a reality. While we continue to fundraise (we are 70% of the way there!!), we have started interviewing general contractors, investigating effective lighting solutions and preparing construction documents to review with the City of Westminster. Please keep an eye out for opportunities to learn more about the project.

Always on our mind is the question of how we can ensure the financial viability of our synagogue. In addition to providing outstanding care for some of the youngest children in our community, our preschool plays a critical role in helping us meet our annual budget. Earlier this year we realized our preschool commonly has a long waiting list, and we identified an opportunity to expand our classroom space: doing so would help us better serve our membership and our community and improve our financial standing. To accomplish this, we had to make a difficult decision to merge two dedicated spaces: our library and the youth lounge. This will allow us to open up a new preschool classroom by transforming our library into a multi-purpose room - one that will serve many different audiences including our library, our youth and our community meetings.

We expect this change to bring new vitality to our library and its broad collection of Jewish and Jewish-themed writing. I encourage each of you to read Michelle Sandler's section of this quarter's Megillah, where she highlights some of these works. Also with this change, we are finding new homes for portions of our collection by creating 3 satellite library locations throughout the synagogue. First, our outstanding collection of 1,100 children's books is now located in the Hebrew School Director's office. When school is in session, the books will be accessible to our young learners. I encourage you to send your children to Elliot Semmelman's office to read and check out any of the wide variety of books in this collection. Our second location is in the multi-purpose room itself: this collection includes 400 non-fiction titles and is accessible to our adults and young adults on weekdays and weekends when the temple space is open and the preschool is closed. Finally, our third location is in the Rabbi's office where you can access nearly 100 volumes in our reference collection. By shelving this collection in the office, these books will be accessible nearly any time our office is staffed.

Finally, another key event took place in the last quarter: as part of our ongoing efforts to ensure we are at the forefront in managing our synagogue's security, we met with the Westminster Police Department to hear their latest perspectives. During the meeting, we learned about all the steps the City of Westminster is taking to address their unhoused population, including hiring additional Homeless Liaisons to provide coverage seven days a week, and building a homeless shelter slated to open next Spring. We also learned that the new Homeless Liaisons are having success connecting with the homeless, moving individuals into nearby shelters and getting them the various forms of assistance they need. I was humbled by their commitment to providing respectful and caring help to individuals who have found themselves without housing. We should all be truly thankful for Beth David's excellent relationship with the Westminster Police Department, and I am personally grateful for their ongoing commitment to working with us. I am also grateful to our resident security expert Dave Baroway who helps us navigate our ongoing commitment to safety.

https://form.jotform.com/232187831479062. To ensure that we have enough seating for the High Holy Days, the Brotherhood recently purchased 40 new chairs, bringing the total to 200.

Sukkot begins on September 29, and the Brotherhood will be assembling its Sukkah on the morning of September 24. We are looking for volunteers to help with the assembly, so if you are available to help, please email me at bethdavidbrotherhood@gmail.com. We recently purchased black bamboo for a new roof for the Sukkah and assembled it, thanks to the help of Steve Loken and Eddie Payan. The roof will support the palm fronds that will be placed on top.

Our Membership Barbecue was scheduled to take place on August 20, but tropical storm Hilary had other ideas. The Membership Barbecue has therefore been rescheduled for Sunday, October 8. The weather should be beautiful at that time of the year, so please join us and bring a salad, side dish, or dessert to share, and the Brotherhood will provide beverages and the main dishes of tri tip, chicken, and veggie burgers. Look for a flyer in this Megillah for more information and to make reservations.

The first two Brotherhood/Adult Education brunches of the year will take place in October. The October 1 brunch will be a celebration of the Temple's 60th anniversary. Plans are underway to have speakers and show video clips and/or a slide show to commemorate this milestone. On October 22, we will have a speaker from the Arava Institute, which is a leading environmental studies and research institute in the Middle East that houses accredited academic programs, research centers, and international cooperation initiatives focusing on a range of environmental concerns and challenges. Last but not least, the Brotherhood is sponsoring another Perry Goldstein production, a matinee on Sunday, December 17, right after Hanukkah. 


From award-winning author Linda Elovitz Marshall and illustrator Zara González Hoang comes this engaging picture book about celebrating Rosh Hashanah.
